## WE ARE WESTSIDE!

In a time of need, there is nothing more important than friends and family. This year, we remembered that lesson as our school community had to pull together during a tragic time. Though we never want to test this potential, it was humbling to be a part of it. People from across our school community came together to do whatever they could to support the family and the school.

I was most proud of our student body. In a time when adults were speechless over the unexplainable loss, students took action. The night of the tragedy, text messages flew across space notifying students of a vigil service that night. Over 300 students from every grade level, background, and social circle showed up that night. Students spent an hour remembering one of their own, not needing us to pro-

vide them anything more than space. This solemn remembrance spilled over to the next day. Students comforted each other in a way that we could not.

Teachers and parents were asked to deal with their own grief while comforting others. As well as could be expected, it worked, and I thank everyone involved for their part in helping our school heal.

This time has served as a personal reminder to me of the importance of each person in our school family. There are students in our school who are dealing with challenges and needs that deserve the same attention as was given for their grief. When asked, our community placed the topic of "relationships" second on its list of expectations for the school, only behind communication. Our students placed it first.

That is a clear message and a clarification call for action. We are aware of the need, but at times may feel that such work is outside the duty of our jobs. After what we have gone through, it is obvious for me that we do not have simple "jobs" any more than doctors and nurses do. We must accept the call for action and purposefully work to make those needed connections with our students.

But we need help from our parents as well. The high school years are an easy time to let go a little bit. The opposite is what is needed. Help us to help your children by consciously seeking out the school to assist in guiding them to success. Check up on their work. Ask them to explain what they have learned. Meet with your child's teachers. The work is complex and at times

## “Who Can Attend Westside High School?”

WHS is a school first and foremost for this community. In talking with a variety of students and community members over the years there seem to be misconceptions regarding the attendance zone for WHS! I have pride in our student body and I know that we all want WHS to be our community school. I have heard too often that, “Anybody can attend Westside, right?” Wrong. In this article, I hope to clear up the confusion that may still exist regarding just *Who Can Attend Westside High School?*

### **Myth #1:**

#### ***Students who live in another school district can transfer to Westside HS.***

If a student lives in Alief ISD, for example, he/she can not transfer to Westside High School.

If a student resides in Alief, Spring Branch, or Katy, they do not have the right to attend Westside High School. In rare cases, a student can pay out of district tuition to attend Westside. The tuition cost is \$7,000.00 per year. If payment is not made, the student will immediately be withdrawn. Westside has had less than five students attend Westside under these circumstances since the school has opened.

### **Myth #2:**

#### ***Students can transfer from any HISD school to Westside High School.***

Approximately 25% of our student body is comprised of transfer students. Most of our transfers are comprised of Magnet Transfers. There is an elite selection process for students who want to apply for our magnet program. A student must exhibit stellar academic achievement, attendance, and behavior before they are admitted. Once a student is admitted on a transfer they must maintain their academic standing in order to remain at Westside, as all transfers are renewed or denied based on the students academics, attendance, and conduct records. Students who are on a transfer other than a Magnet Transfer are not eligible for transportation services to Westside.

### **Myth #4:**

#### ***A student can just say they are living with a friend in order to attend Westside HS.***

The state requires a multitude of documents in order for ANY student to enroll at WHS. In addition to providing documents such as a birth certificate, legal guardianship, and immunizations, **ALL** incoming students must prove they live in our attendance zone. Each of these documents is a state auditable document and we are relentless in obtaining this paperwork before allowing a child to enroll.

WHS is unique in that it is surrounded by other school districts, & because WHS is a top tier school, families often wish to send their child to our school instead of the school to which they are zoned. We employ our campus police officers to check residences to verify student addresses when the need arises. When it is determined that the student does not live at that address, the student is withdrawn from WHS. ## A NEW LOOK FOR 2008-2009 STUDENT COUNCIL

Thursday, March 27<sup>th</sup> was a day in the history books for WHS as a leadership team of students, teachers and administrators gathered to create and adopt a new constitution for WHS's Student Government Organization. Current Student Council leadership, current and future teacher sponsors and top members of the school administration team all collaborated to set forth a series of protocols and procedures that will govern the student body. The 2008-2009 Council consists of 20 Executive Council members, including a President and 4 Vice-Presidents (Communications, Finance, Records, and Philanthropy) from each class and approximately 100 House Representatives. This structure provides a flow of communication to administration, students, and staff. The WHS Executive Board election was April 23-25. House Representatives and next year's freshmen officers will be elected in the fall. Student government is a great opportunity for Westside students to learn leadership skills, commitment, and responsibility. Congratulations to the “rejuvenated and energized” Student Council!





## SUMMER SCHOOL 2008

WHS will offer 2 types of summer school this year. Credit Recovery is free and provides an opportunity for students who failed a class to regain credit and Tuition Summer School (\$150 per semester course) gives students a chance to earn original credit in selected courses to advance or make room in their schedule to accommodate electives during the school year.

Registration will be held **June 4, 2008** from 8:00 – 11:00 am and 12:00 – 3:00 pm in the WHS Commons. (Registration for PAP Math Tuition courses is ongoing; please see below.) Report Cards will be available for pick-up as you must provide a copy at time of registration. If you are registering for a tuition course, please bring cash or money order made payable to Westside High School. We will also accept late registration through June 6, 2008 based on availability (same time and place). Please note that students must not have more than two absences during the four-week session (no absences in the one-week session) to receive credit and attendance records begin June 5 regardless of your registration date. In other words, if you miss the first day or two of summer school these will count towards the allowable absences.

If you are not sure if you received a passing grade in a spring semester course, come to school on June 4 during registration to pick up your report card!

### CREDIT RECOVERY SUMMER SCHOOL 2008

There are 3 options to recover credit in a class previously failed. If your report card semester grade was 65-69, you may take the one-week course to recover credit; if your grade was 60 or higher you should take the four-week summer school or enroll in the Plato Recovery Lab. Students must make at least a 60 in the semester course with no more than 5 unexcused absences to qualify for Recovery Summer School. The minimum grade does not apply to the Plato Recovery Lab.

### B. FOUR-WEEK SESSION

(Report Card grade of 60-64)

**Times:** Morning Session 8:00 – 11:00 am  
or Afternoon Session 12 – 3:00 pm

**Class Time:** Each class is 90 minutes. “A” semester classes are offered the first 90 minutes and “B” semester classes are offered the second 90 minutes. The same is true for the afternoon session. Students may recover credit for up to 2 semester courses (one full credit) only; the two sessions are offered to accommodate more students.

### C. PLATO RECOVERY LAB

**Dates:** June 5 – July 2, 2008

**Times:** Morning Session 8:00 – 11:00 am  
or Afternoon Session 12 – 3:00 pm

#### Credit Recovery Courses Offered:

The Plato Lab offers computer-based credit recovery instead of teacher instructed courses. Only junior and senior core classes are offered (e.g. English 3 or 4, Chemistry, US History, etc.). Students work at their own pace but courses must be completed during summer school. Attendance rules apply – no more than 2 absences!

### TUITION SUMMER SCHOOL 2008

A selection of courses is offered for original credit to students who wish to advance or make room in their schedule to accommodate electives during the school year.

#### A. Tuition Courses Offered

Health, Speech, P.E. (one-semester or .5 credit)

Art A and B, PAP Chemistry A and B (two-semester or 1.0 credit):

**Dates:** June 5 – July 2, 2008

**Times:** Morning Session 8:00 – 11:00 am and Afternoon Session 12 – 3:00 pm

**Class Time:** Each semester class is 3 hours/day. Two-semester courses (Art and PAP Chemistry) are scheduled with the “A” semester class in the morning session and “B” semester class in the afternoon session. This schedule enables students to earn credit for two one-semester courses or a year-long course over the 4-week summer school.

#### B. Math Tuition Courses Offered

PAP Pre-Calculus A and B (two-semester or 1.0 credit):

**Dates:** June 9 – 27 (A) and July 14 – August 1, 2008 (B)

**Times:** 8:00 am – 12:00 pm

### INERTIA WINS TEAM TITLE AT NATIONAL COMPETITION

Our Westside INERTIA Dance Company earned top honors at the MA National Dance Competition March 28-31 at the Ft. Worth Convention Center. This competition is huge with 124 teams from across the country, including a team from Hawaii, and over 1,200 dances performed. We are proud to announce our INERTIA Dance Company scored 865 points and the title of High Point team in the United States and the entire team will be awarded MA National Champion letter jackets!

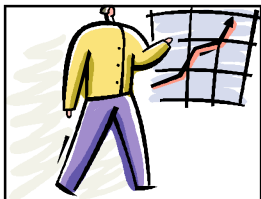

### EAST 1 BUSINESS ACADEMY



The East One Business Academy is bustling with activity as students have been hard at work all year through various activities and classes. One of East One's main goals is to provide students with as many opportunities as possible to help them be more successful in and out of school. This semester, students have worked hard in the nationally chartered Business Professionals of America (BPA), the Outback Entrepreneurship Program, Skills USA, WHS Business Ownership, Information Technology Literacy (IT Lit), and numerous internships. Having experience in these types of business organizations better prepares students for summer opportunities, college, and the job market.

East One sent 3 students to State in the Culinary Arts Competition for Skills USA, taking 5 students to state in various BPA competitions, placing 2nd in the Junior Achievement Company Program Trade Fair Competition for Best Sales Presentation. New classes began this year: the WHS Business Ownership class where students sold stock to start a company, ran all aspects of it, and then liquidated it. They are currently composing their letter to the stockholders to send out along with their share of the profits. New classes are being planned, such as Sports Marketing, Banking & Finance, & International Business. Students always have the opportunity as an upperclassman to take Administrative Procedures, which is when students leave campus during 6th and 7th period to intern at a company in the community. All of these opportunities allow students to develop a strong résumé of rich experiences to help them land great summer opportunities. This year, we have 2 students accepted into the University of Alabama Capstone Leadership Business Summer Program. Other students are traveling across the country for summer programs from California to New York. East One will be working hard to increase our partnerships with companies in the community.

### NORTH 2 APPLIED SCIENCE AND HEALTH PROFESSIONS



This year the HST program has continued to grow at WHS. We began our Health Science Technology II class in which the students visit West Houston Medical Hospital twice per week & get to observe various facets of the medical field. While the students only observe (they do not treat patients), they have had great exposure to fields like emergency medicine, surgery, labor and delivery, MRI, physical therapy, etc. This really has been a great opportunity for these students to get to see what these careers have to offer.

Next year, we will continue to grow our HST program. We will be offering Intro to Health Science Technology & Medical Terminology as 9th grade coursework for HST. These are semester classes. Also, we are going to offer a Health Science Career Prep class which will be more like an internship for seniors who have already completed HST I and II. HST will offer a Pharmacy Tech certification class.

A biomedical research opportunity (BIOS) that pairs students with researchers and enables the students to conduct real medical research is in partnership with Baylor College of Medicine. Only 20 students are accepted into the program and it is a rare exposure to the world of medical research that very few high school students get to experience. This year, 6 Westside students were chosen for the program Haley Swanson, Mark Reilly, Emily Brill, Ruba Alafifi, Trey Ellington and Kerry Chu.

Field trips included 2 different dates for students to view an open heart surgery at St. Luke's Hospital, the UT Health Science Center to learn what kind of research is occurring in various labs, Texas Woman's University to explore their nursing and physical therapy programs. Finally, we are trying to get some of our seniors a chance to visit Baylor's Medical School to see what medical school is really like.

## EAST 2

### MEDIA RELATIONS AND LAW



Things have been busy this spring in East 2 Media Relations and Law! Mr. Hill's AP Human Geography class ran the first ever East 2 open primary. Over 550 students voted IL Senator Barak Obama the winner with over 52% of the vote. 2nd place went to NY Senator Hillary Clinton with 15% and AZ Senator John McCain at 10.5% of the vote.

We were fortunate to have two guest speakers: Mr. Lew Goodrick, grandfather of freshman Timothy Lancaster, is a missionary in Kenya. He was recently caught up in the political instability of the country in the wake of Kenya's last election & discussed the situation in Kenya and Western Africa. Mr. Brian Reese, father of freshman Joshua Reese, works for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and came to talk about urban renovation and redevelopment of the lower income housing areas in the wake of widespread gentrification.

We've posted some Media Relations and Law summer opportunities in Houston on our website, including a Human Relations Internship with El Paso Corporation, Ushers with Cinemark Theatres, Market Research positions, an Advertising Assistant and jobs for camp counselors. There are also numerous enrichment opportunities for students interested in a future career in Media Relations or Law: Boston University has an Institute for Television, Film and Radio Production program, a Young Writer's Camp in CA, an International Language and Culture Program, foreign exchange opportunities and programs through Brown University, Cambridge, and Harvard to name a few. This initiative will be limited to approximately 50 students. Please visit our web page for additional information and application forms or contact N1 Deans regarding the application process.

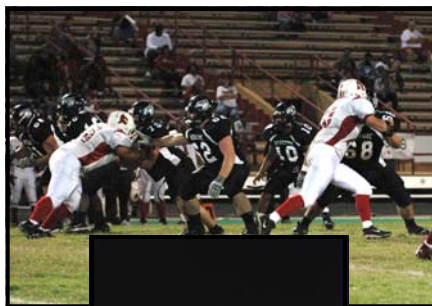
